

# HOP TO IT

Standout beers and ales are brewing all over Washington.

**I**N WASHINGTON, wines may get a lot of publicity these days—and deservedly so—but the state's craft brewers also enjoy a robust reputation. Since local farmers are among the nation's largest producers of hops and barley, the microbrew movement has had fertile ground on which to develop. The late Bert Grant, whose Yakima brewery is (sadly) no longer operating, is considered a pioneer in the field. Today, more than 80 breweries and brewpubs in all parts of the state craft their own versions of traditional styles and design innovative variations. ### Son of Frog, North Fork Brewery **BP**

### Cabin Fever, Boundary Bay Brewing Co **BP**

A winter ale with a dark, red-brown color and a malty flavor, dry-hopped lightly with Cascade hops for a slightly spicy finish. A strong ale, it tastes smooth thanks to long cold conditioning. [www.bbaybrewery.com](http://www.bbaybrewery.com)

## SILVERDALE

### Hale's Cream Ale, Hale's Brewery **BP**

The favorite ale of Fremont, the quirky Seattle neighborhood that proclaims itself "the center of the universe" during its June Solstice Celebration. ### The Immortal India Pale Ale, Elysian Brewing Company **BP**

### Smelter's Stout, Northern Ales **BP**

### Lightfoot Lager, Walking Man Brewing **BP**
